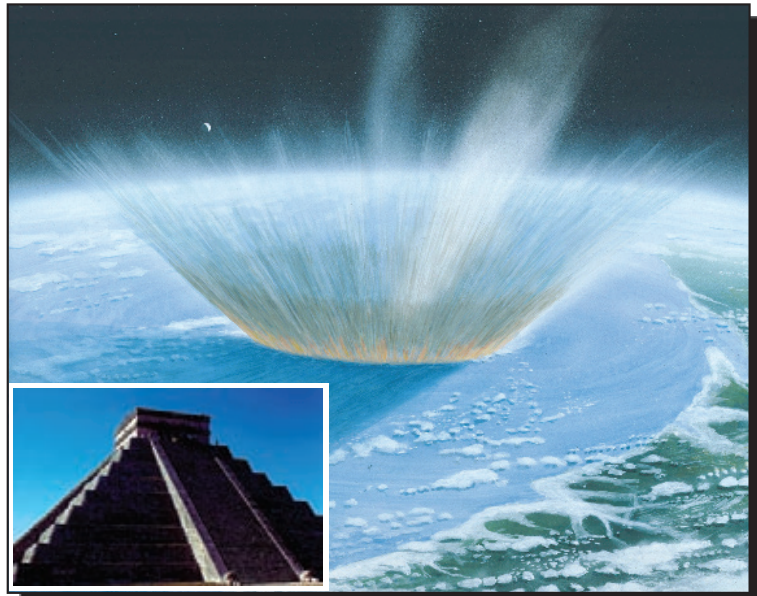
Dear Members & Friends:

Join us and discover the “**Land of the Ancient Maya**”—including the **Chicxulub Meteor impact crater**! See 3,000 years of history come alive and learn about the Meteor 65 million years ago, and its impact on life on earth!

We are privileged to have **Dr. Bruce Love**, a noted Yucatan Maya expert, as our leader on this expedition. Under Dr. Love's excellent leadership, we will explore fascinating Maya sites in Yucatan and learn about the Chicxulub Meteor impact and the astroarchaeological heritage of the Maya sites.

The itinerary includes:

- **Merida**, formerly the Maya capital “T’ho,” and in 2000 the first city to be designated an “American Capital of Culture.”
- **Uxmal**, a superb Maya site whose architecture shows an influence of highland Mexico. This reflects the distant trade routes during the Maya classic period.
- **Puuc Hill sites**, including Kabah, Sayil, and Labna, with many small buildings with geometric, mosaic patterns across the facades.
- **Dzibilchaltun**, a noted Maya site which spans 2,000 years as a Maya administrative and ceremonial city from 1,500 BC until European conquest in the 1,540's including the astronomical central plaza.
- **Chicxulub Meteor site**, on the Yucatan coast near the ancient center of the impact 65 million years ago.
- **Izamal**, the center of worship to the Sun God and the Supreme God, Itzamna. See the cathedral and walk among dozen of pyramids.
- **Chichen Itza**, the greatest Maya site in the Yucatan. You may walk up the steps of El Castillo for a commanding



view of one of the largest of all Maya sites and discover its many temples, ballcourt, and more!

- **Balancanche**, the mysterious 300-meter-deep cave with ceremonial incense burners, colorful pots, and ritual grinding stones.
- **Coba**, a Maya site with towering pyramids and stelae, but still only about 10-15% uncovered from the luxuriant growth of tropical forest.
- **Tulum**, a Maya site with dramatic sea coast location overlooking the Caribbean, and a major trading center for the Maya, near the resort community of **Cancun**.

We invite you to join us as we discover the ancient Maya wonders of the Yucatan Peninsula and seek answers to long sought questions about the Maya civilization, Chicxulub Meteor, and Dinosaur Extinction.

Itinerary

Day 1 Houston to Merida, Mexico

Fly from Houston to Merida, capital of the state of Yucatan, and Maya capital—T'ho. Transfer to the *Hotel El Castellano*, in the heart of the historic center of Merida near the main plaza.

Day 2 Uxmal & Puuc Hill

Today, we'll drive across the Yucatan Peninsula to explore Uxmal. Here architecture shows an influence of highland Mexico with geometric mosaics across the upper facades. This dry inland site has a number of images of Chac, the rain god, and numerous reservoirs. The Magician's House has a mouth entrance of a gigantic Chac and is over 125 feet tall. The Governor's Palace was one of Frank Lloyd Wright's favorite buildings, and influenced some of his later work. Evening pool-side lecture on the development and collapse of the Classic Maya civilization. Overnight at *Hacienda Uxmal (1 night)*. (B,L,D)

Day 3 Kabah, Sayil, Labna & Merida

We will explore Uxmal's satellite sites this morning on the Puuc Route, including Kabah, Sayil and Labna. These sites are small, but offer many examples of the distinct Puuc architecture that offers marvelous detail and a deeper acquaintance of the Maya civilization. El Palacio at Sayil is a massive three-tiered building with huge Chac masks. A palapa protects a stone stele depicting the fertility god.

Labna is located in a broad flat area with El Palacio in the center and vegetation sprouting out the top. See some of the lime-lined reservoirs used to store water during the dry season for the 3,000 inhabitants of Labna. We will then return to Merida. Lecture on the Chicxulub Meteor impact on the Gulf of Mexico and Yucatan. *Hotel El Castellano 2 nights*. (B,L)

Day 4 Dzibilchaltun & Meteor Site

We will first visit Dzibilchaltun, a Maya archaeological site that spans 2,000 years and was an administrative and ceremonial city. See the Temple of Seven Dolls with an astronomical orientation for the rising of the sun at the equinoxes. Here in 1958 the National Geographic Society sponsored a diving expedition and discovered



over 30,000 Maya artifacts in the sandy deposits of this inland sinkhole. Have lunch overlooking the Gulf of Mexico. Then visit the village of Chicxulub at the edge of the impact crater (for which the Meteor is named). See the impact site (all peaceful today) and imagine the unbelievable impact when the Meteor hit!

Continue our discussion of the Meteor and its impact on the flora and fauna of the world. (B,L)

Day 5 Izamal & Chichen Itza

Izamal was a center of ceremonial worship to the Sun God Kinich-Kakmo and the Maya supreme god, Itzamna. Walk among the temple pyramids, and see the largest Maya pyramid. Some of the Spanish conquistadors built a church on top as a symbol of conquest.

In the afternoon, begin your exploration of Chichen Itza, the most famous and best restored of all the Maya sites in Yucatan. Begin at the base of the great El Castillo (Pyramid of Kukulcan). This allows you to better understand the massive scale of the central buildings of shrines, which housed the nobles, priests, and their staffs. The size of the central complex allows estimates of the populations of the surrounding site as up to 100,000. Imagine the thatched houses, plots of vegetables, workshops, and cooking fires that could be seen from atop El Castillo! The Sacred Cenote (water hole) has

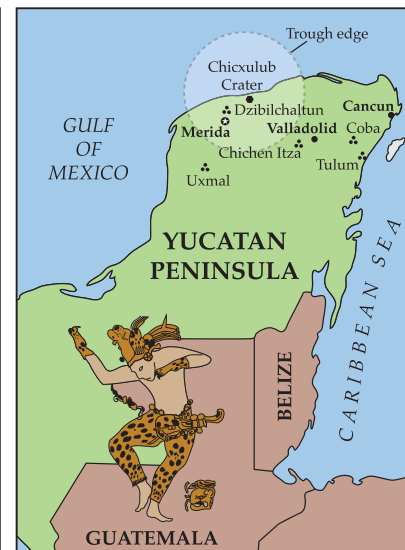


Chicxulub Meteor Crater

The Chicxulub crater is an impact crater 110 miles wide on the northern coast of the Yucatan Peninsula, Mexico. The small fishing village of Chicxulub is near the ancient center of the impact and gives the massive crater its name. It was discovered by petroleum scientists looking for oil in the late 1970's.

The age of rocks and isotope analysis show that this impact crater dates from the end of the Cretaceous Period, roughly 65 million years ago. Evidence from paleontology, geochemistry, geophysics, and sedimentology all support the theory that this impact occurred at the Cretaceous and Tertiary boundary and led to the extinction of about 50% of all species of life on Earth including the great dinosaurs.

The rare element iridium is concentrated at the T-K boundary and also in meteors. It is associated with great heat. Impact features of the surrounding rock add more evidence of the destructive power of this meteor. The Space Shuttle photographed a 3-6 foot ridge denoting a trough on one side and cenotes (sink holes) on the other. These important water sources partly owe their formation to the Chicxulub meteor impact.



yielded thousands of gold and jade jewelry pieces from all parts of eastern Mexico. Overnight at *Chichen Itza Hotel (2 nights)*. (B,L,D)

Day 6 Chichen Itza

We will continue our exploration of Chichen Itza at a leisurely pace. First visit the Temple of the Jaguars and Shields alongside the largest Maya ball court in all of Mexico. The temple has fine columns with carved rattlesnakes and etched jaguars. Inside the temple are mural fragments depicting the Maya in a successful battle. The ball court is one of eight at Chichen Itza and carvings depict players in many aspects of the game.

In the afternoon, explore El Caracol, the observatory with an inner spiral staircase where Maya astronomers may have had windows aligned to best predict the seasons for planting their crops. (B,L,D)

Day 7 Balancanche & Ek Balam

Just a short drive will bring us to Balancanche, a 300-meter cave. In 1960 archaeologists discovered ceremonial incense burners, colorful pots and ritual metates and manos (grinding stones) here. At the entrance to the cave is a botanic garden with many of the native plants of the region.

In the late afternoon, we will take a short ride to Ek Balam, one of the newest and most spectacular discoveries in recent years, with 1000-year old plaster sculptures of monsters and gods, freshly uncovered by archaeologists. *El Meson del Marques (1 night), Valladolid*. (B,L,D)

Day 8 Coba & Tulum to Cancun

This morning we will explore one of the largest of all Maya sites, Coba. Coba is only about 10-15% uncovered from the heavy forest growth. It was established before Chichen Itza and may have covered 40 square kilometers and supported over 40,000 people. Coba's towering pyramids and stelae resemble the architecture of Tikal more than the much closer sites in Yucatan. Some stelae depict Tikal rulers standing on captives.

This afternoon visit Tulum, the most picturesque of all Maya sites, perched on a bluff overlooking the Caribbean Sea. The seaside fortress would have provided protection and storage of trade goods from other parts of the Caribbean. Depart

for Cancun. Enjoy a farewell dinner in celebration of our journey. *Westin Resort, Cancun (1 night)*. (B,L,D)

Day 9 Cancun to USA

Morning transfer to the airport for flights back to the USA. (Optional extension in Cancun will be offered.) (B)

Leadership

Leading this expedition will be **Dr. Bruce Love**, one of the top Maya archaeologists specializing in the Yucatan.

Dr. Love received his Ph.D. in Maya anthropology from UCLA, and has been traveling and exploring the Yucatan Peninsula since 1971. He has published widely on Maya archaeology and cultural anthropology, especially decipherment of the ancient hieroglyphic writing and contemporary Maya religion. He has written on both the Paris and Dresden Codexs, Yucatec Rituals, and Maya agricultural ceremonies.

Dr. Love will provide interpretation and evening lectures, and will be joined by local guides. He looks forward to sharing his knowledge of the Maya and Chicxulub Meteor impact of the Yucatan Peninsula with you.
